

### Damage Action Filed in Court

#### Condemnation Suit Changed from Yamhill County

Damages totaling \$25,920 are sought by Jess Lee in a suit filed Saturday against L. Shinberger of Hillsboro. The plaintiff alleges in his suit that Shinberger's car struck a horse ridden by Lee April 8 on the highway west of Hillsboro. He asks general damages of \$25,000, alleging that he was thrown from the horse and suffered injuries to his back and hip as a result of the accident. Special damages of \$500 for loss of time and \$420 for medical attention is also sought.

Transcript of the proceedings in the condemnation suit brought by the state highway commission against Charles Bruce and Herbert B. Miller was filed with the county clerk here Friday when the court venue was changed from Yamhill to Washington county. The action was started January 26 of this year to obtain right-of-way for widening the Middleton-Newberg section of the West Side Pacific highway.

Defendants in the suit contend that the 167 acres of property involved is worth more than the \$200 alleged by the highway body. They ask \$845 for the land and \$1109.20 for damages. Change of venue was sought and obtained on the contention that a jury of Yamhill county citizens would be interested in the outcome of the action.

Lee McFarland of Aloha entered pleas of not guilty to two assault and battery indictments Saturday in the circuit court. John Schmid and S. G. Rhodes are complaining witnesses.

W. A. Hardman of Beaverton was fined \$25 and costs in the local justice of the peace court Thursday when he was charged with a charge of reckless driving. He was arrested last Wednesday.

Scheduled trial of E. C. Jones of Cedar Mill at the local justice of the peace court Friday on a charge of failure to have a license for his dog failed to materialize. Jones changed his plea to one of guilty and was fined \$10 and costs. The fine was suspended on condition that he obtain the necessary license.
