Warning Given on Use of Firecrackers

SALEM, June 24 (Special)—Hugh H. Earle, state fire marshal, calls attention to the added danger connected with the use of firecrackers this year. One product known as a bomb which is about one inch long and 1/4-inch in diameter is claimed to have contained 43 grains of explosive. The explosive was not a gun powder but reacted with much greater violence than gun powder. This is over four times the violence of the customary firecracker and the hazard connected with them is much greater. Dealers cannot escape their responsibility in selling these high explosives and particularly when selling to minors. Parents should also properly instruct their children, otherwise there may be many serious accidents and disastrous fire losses.
