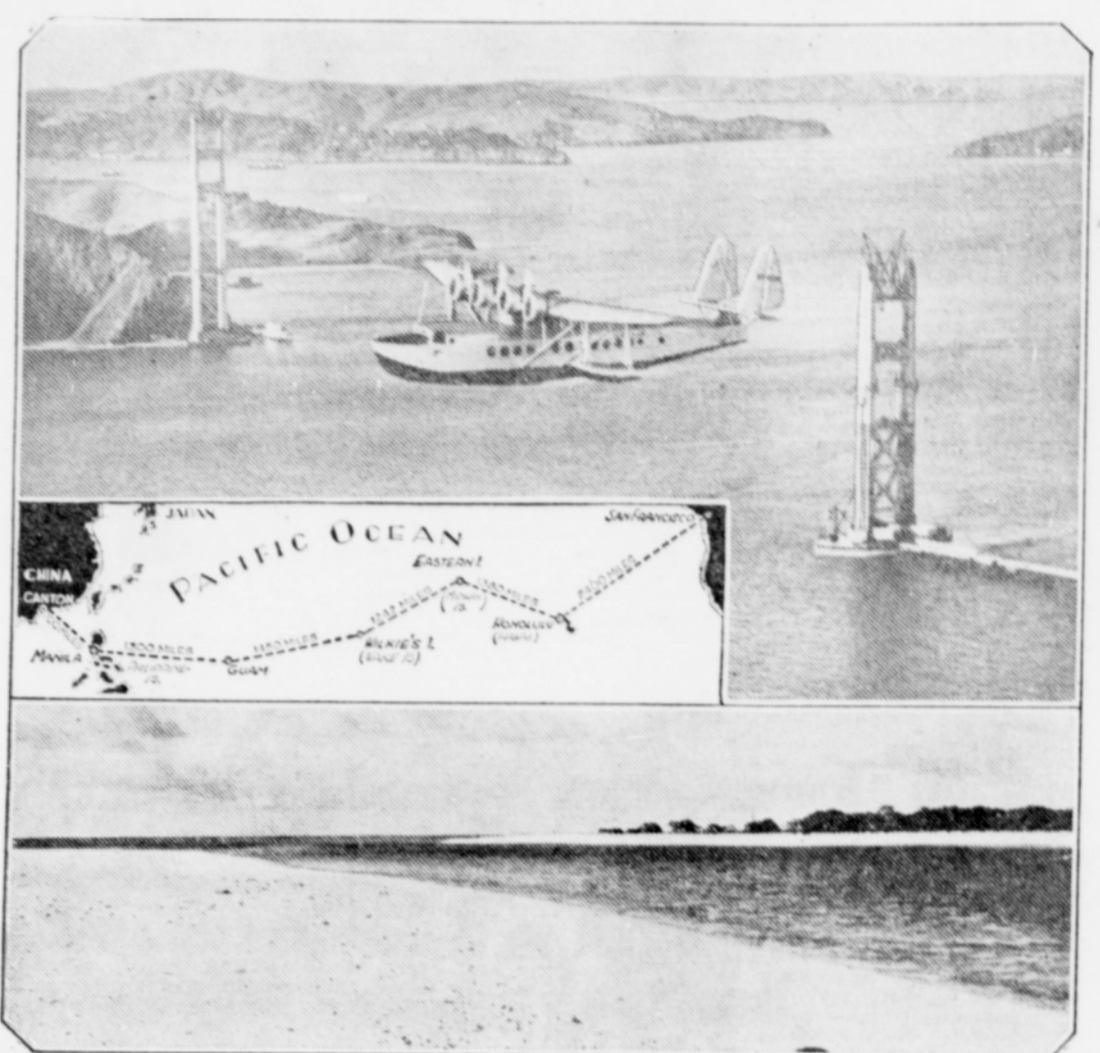

## Trans-Pacific Air Service Soon to Change 'Far East' to 'Near East'

PROGRESS is bringing the Orient "next door" to America. This summer it will be possible to step into an ocean air liner in California and, after about three days of comfortable flying, arrive in remote China. Until now, the fastest steamship has required three weeks for the trip.

A whirlwind of recent activity is making possible this amazing achievement. While a steamer is dropping off men and supplies at islands dotting the trail to the Far East, converting them into veritable "stepping-stones," the giant Pan American Clipper has been tested over the first lap of the route.

Clipping a series of personnel-training, experimental flights with a recent record-smashing hop to Hawaii, the Clipper's crew has spent several days flying about the territory, collecting data necessary when regular passenger and freight service starts this summer.

THE Pan American Clipper, and its sister ship, the Brazilian Clipper, will inaugurate trans-

Pacific service. Each has a wingspread of 114 feet, is nearly 70 feet long and has four motors which develop 2800 h. p. to propel 19 gross tons of weight through the air at a cruising speed of 150 miles an hour. Each can accommodate 32 passengers, a crew, and a ton of mail and cargo over normal ranges. Another and still larger type of ship, the Martin Clipper, with a maximum capacity of 53, may be drafted into this nucleus of America's future commercial air fleet.

Bases are being set up at four points: desolate Eastern Island in the Midway group, Wilkie's Island in the Wake group, Guam and Manila. At each, the steamship North Haven is dropping a crew of men, pre-fabricated buildings, food supplies—in fact, nearly every necessity down to garden seed and collar buttons.

In July or August, all the Pacific bases will be ready for operation. Soon afterward, passengers can step aboard a commodious plane at Alameda or San

Diego, Calif., and, after a short stop in Honolulu, find themselves on the previously uninhabited Eastern Island the next day.

Here they will see a modern airport and midjet community as they step ashore. There will be huge underground gasoline storage tanks, a powerhouse, and a building housing a powerful radio transmitter.

Nearly will be the transmitting station of the radio direction finder which guides the huge ships. Other frame buildings will be the airport office, radio receiving station, and snug staff quarters.

A similar view will greet the passengers at Wilkie's Island. Two more stops, at Guam, and at Manila in the Philippines, then the nose of the great Clipper will turn north for the comparatively short last lap into Canton, China, where it will connect with the Pan American's 3000-mile Chinese system.

And a new chapter in the dramatic saga of transportation as colorful as that written by the glamorous Yankee clippers of the last century, will unfold.
