The local boys had the bases loaded in the last of the ninth, but a sensational catch of a line drive by Thirdbaseman Schmidt of Cornelius threw the side. Attendance was estimated at 300.

Each team was awarded a \$1.50 cake by the Perfection Bakery. Best player award of \$1.25 in cash to the best boy on each team, given by George Wick, Hillsboro Motor company salesman, went to Bill Ziegler of Hillsboro and Hermans of Cornelius.

First runs on either side were scored by Schmidt of Cornelius and Banner of Hillsboro, who each received a baseball from Corwin Hardware. For best hitters on each nine, Hammer of Hillsboro received a bat from Dr. J. O. which any public utility could charge. He stated, however, that the ordinance must be submitted to the public utility commissioner for his approval or objection before it could be finally passed. The ordinance as proposed would run until November 15, 1937, the time when the present franchise expires, or until the ordinance was amended or repealed. Copy of the act was ordered mailed to the public utility commissioner.

Councilmen also instructed the city manager to prepare an application to the federal government for a 45 per cent grant toward the construction of a municipal water system. No action has apparently been taken on previous applications for PWA funds and councilmen felt that the application for a grant would stand a better chance of being approved.

Permission was granted to local firemen to conduct a parade and to shoot fireworks on July 4.
