**Mrs. Fred Bovee Suffers Leg
Fracture Thursday**

BANKS—Much excitement was caused Thursday night when Mr. Shipp, who lives north of Banks, failed to return home after a trip to Hillsboro. He walked for a long time then found he was eighteen miles from Banks so rested until daylight then made it home.
