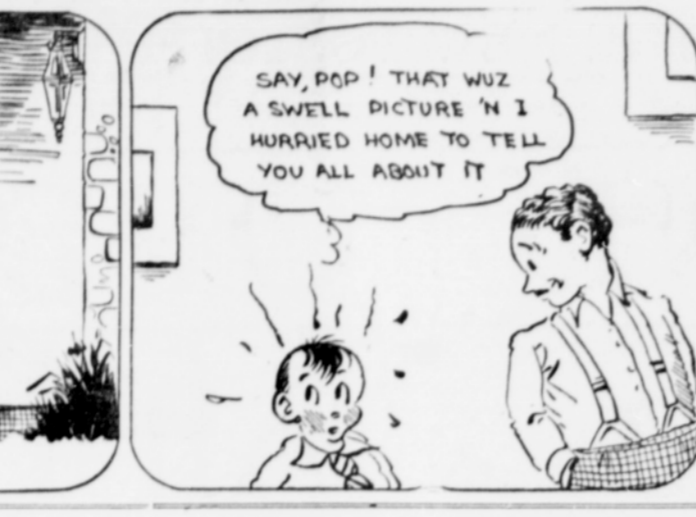
**Farmington**

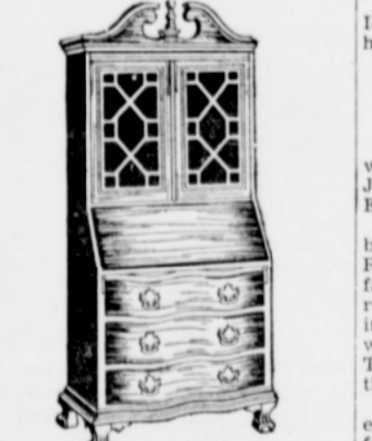

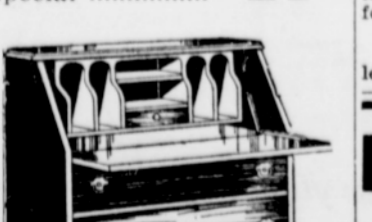
