

# Bears Meet Verboort Here Sunday

## Locals Defeat Sherwood Nine

### Three Home Runs and High Score Inning Featured

Verboort, 4 0 1,000; Carlton, 3 2 400; Amity, 2 1 567; Hillsboro, 2 3 400; Sherwood, 2 2 600; Vernonia, 0 4 000; Forest Grove, 3 2 600; Newberg, 0 4 000.

Hillsboro "Bears" will clash with the Verboort nine, leaders of the Tualatin Valley league, on the Shute park diamond Sunday afternoon. Inspired by a 12 to 10 victory over the second place Sherwood team last Sunday, the "Bears" are determined to upset the visitors if possible.

Hillsboro-Sherwood game was featured by a wild eighth inning Sunday, each team scoring six runs during the frame. The locals held a 6 to 4 advantage at the start of the inning. Pouncing on Reisbach's deliveries, Hillsboro batsmen cracked out six hits, one a home run by Rightfielder Rogers. Sherwood came right back with a vengeance and scored six tallies on four hits, two walks and an error.

Hillsboro opened the scoring in the second inning with two runs. Sherwood tied the score with runs in the second and third frames. Three runs in the fourth, two of which were scored on a four-base hit by LaBounty, first baseman, and a home run in the sixth by Shortstop Reeves put the locals permanently in the lead. Sherwood scored two in the sixth.

Verboort continued a clean slate Sunday by downing Vernonia 13 to 9 at Verboort. Carlton nosed out Forest Grove 9 to 8, while Amity won from Newberg by forfeit.
