Game Too Expensive

They wouldn't have called it that, but newspaper publishers and advertisers used to have a great time playing hide and seek. Publishers hid behind greatly exaggerated circulation claims while advertisers were seeking the facts without being able to find them.

The advertiser was usually "it." He was supposed to close his eyes, count out his good money, say nothing and hope for the best. Finally, advertisers banded together and decided

the game was too expensive to play. That's when the Audit Bureau of Circulations (A. B. C.) came to the front and said: "We'll do the seeking-and finding." In spite of the fact that four-fifths of the total daily newspaper circulation in the United States is now audited and verified by the Audit Bureau of Cir-

culations, some newspapers continue to play hide and seek with circulation figures. It's no trouble to hide such figures and, almost without exception, it's impossible for the advertiser to find proof that supports these figures unless the newspaper is an A. B. C. mem-An A. B.
