Mayor J. H. Garrett Ranks as Dean of All Hillsboro's Retail Merchants

Who is the dean of Hillsboro's retail merchants? What local mercantile establishment is the oldest in point of continuous operation at its present location and under its present ownership?

The first is none other than Hillsboro's genial mayor, J. H. (Jack) Garrett, who has owned and operated a dry goods store in this city for more than 26 years. The second is Garrett's C. C. store, moved to its present location on Main street between Second and Third avenues in 1910 and operated there continuously ever since by Garrett.

Seeking to establish a branch store of a Vancouver, Wash., concern in northwestern Oregon or southeastern Washington, Garrett came to Hillsboro early in 1909 and selected this city as the most promising for the new venture. Location first selected was in the Linklater building on Second avenue, the present site of L. V. Hull's trading store.

A year later Garrett purchased full control of the local branch and, retaining the store name of C. C. Store, moved to his present location on Main street, a new building that had just been completed by the late James Imbrie. And, speaking of the C. C. Store, how many of the customers who make purchases each day in Garrett's establishment know the origin of the name? The initials stand for Carter & Carter, the Vancouver firm which established the branch store here under Garrett's management.

The local merchant's first venture in the dry goods business was at Pendleton in 1903. Within a short time he had built up a thriving trade but burned out in 1906 with a \$3000 loss. Prior to launching his mercantile career he had taught school in Umatilla county for eight years and still holds a life certificate from the state education department.

Garrett turned to homesteading in the White Salmon country of Washington following the loss of his business in Pendleton and proved up on a large tract in the required 18 months. In 1907 he went to Vancouver, Wash., and was employed for more than a year by the Carter & Carter firm. Then on March 17, 1909, he opened the Hillsboro C. C. Store.

Many changes and improvements have taken place in Hillsboro during the 26 years that Jack Garrett has been located here. However, he believes that the replacement of the early plank streets for the present black-top pavements was the biggest improvement of all. Paving in 1909 consisted of wood planks in the middle of the streets. In the winter water and mud

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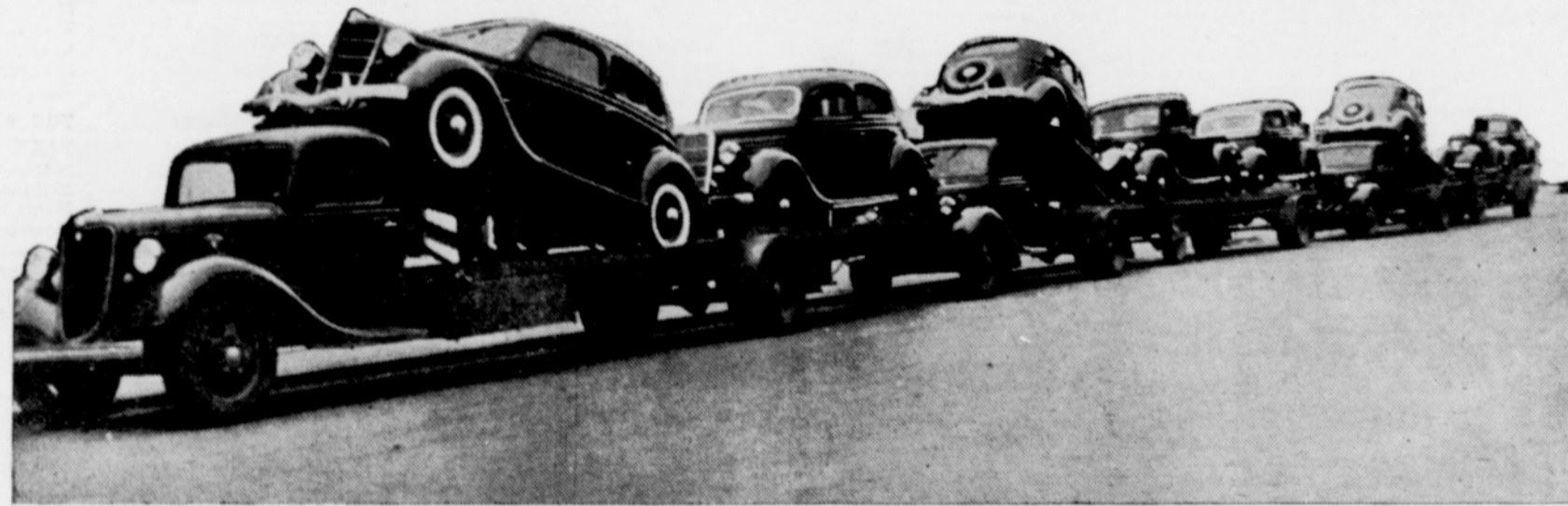
