Hillsboro Drops First Tilt of Second-Half Schedule

Local Sunset leaguers dropped their first game of the second-half schedule Sunday to Aloha, winners of the first-half by a score of 13 to 2.

Hillsboro still holds a one-game lead in the league in the matter of games won and lost, but some doubt exists as to whether or not games played against North Plains and Banks, recently of the Washington County league, will count against the Sunset standings.

Tualatin lost to North Plains Sunday 7 to 4. If this game counts, the locals have a one-game lead. If the game is disregarded and the forfeit from Gaston, North Plains' predecessor in the league, is recognized, Tualatin and Hillsboro would be tied for first place with seven wins and one loss.

Also, if such games are eliminated, the game against North Plains would not count this Sunday and Hillsboro would automatically be credited with eight wins and one loss. Tualatin has yet to face the strong Sherwood squad.

Hillsboro's first run against Aloha came on successive doubles by Fox and Clyde Brandan in the second inning. The final score came in the ninth when Joss was hit by a pitched ball, stole second and then came home on Hanna's long fly.

"Mose" Jubitz of Aloha hurled a sparkling game, allowing but five scattered hits and striking out 13 batters. Aloha pounced on Rosky, Hillsboro pitcher, for eight runs in four innings. Brandan replaced Rosky, but two errors and five hits produced five more runs.

North Plains has defeated two top teams in the Sunset league and a good game is in prospect when Hillsboro meets the squad here Sunday afternoon. "Lefty" Grogan, Auld, Wahner, Cook and Sigler of the North Plains nine are all Hillsboro boys.

In other Sunset league games Sunday Banks defeated Orenco 7 to 5 and Willamette defeated Laurel 7 to 5. Sherwood forfeited to Cornelius.
