Five Killed Near Cochran When Bridge Collapses



Five men went to their death August 6 three miles west of Cochran, Washington county, on the Southern Pacific Tillamook branch when a wooden trestle gave way under the Tillamook bound freight train. General view, taken from the side from which the train rode onto the trestle, spanning Little Baldwin creek, shows remains of the broken trestle piled amid the engine, box car and gondola that went over. The rest of the 38-car train was stopped. Engineer, fireman, two brakemen and one bridge worker met death in the crash, one of the most disastrous in the history of the Southern Pacific.
