

Four-H Group Attends Tour

Members Visit Livestock Projects in Valley

Ninety-one club members and leaders from seven counties in the Willamette valley and coast sections attended the third Willamette valley 4-H livestock tour, which was held in Yamhill and Washington counties the first of last week. L. J. Allen, assistant state club leader, Rex Warren, county agent of Yamhill county, and L. E. Francis, assistant county agent of Washington county, arranged and led the tour.

The four Washington county boys who attended were Glen Ireland of Greenview, Marvin Heydenreich of Schefflin, John Hansen of Rock Creek, and Clayton Nyberg of Tualatin.

First half of the tour was held in Yamhill county, where the boys visited the farms of Alex Cruickshank and Frank Brown & Sons. At these places they judged Guernsey cattle, Suffolk, Cotswold and Hampshire sheep and Shorthorn cattle. They also were given demonstrations on fitting sheep and beef cattle. In addition to the judging work and fitting demonstrations the boys acquired considerable information regarding breeding, feeding and management practices on these farms.

The remainder of the tour was spent in Washington county. At the Robert Warren's farm the boys were shown the various irrigation projects. On this irrigation phase of the tour Arthur King, extension specialist in irrigation, accompanied the boys.

The second stop was at the Hag Brothers' farm, where the boys had an opportunity to study the buildings, equipment and plan of management of this dairy farm. They were also given instructions in judging dairy cattle and then judged a class of Jersey producing cows. A demonstration on fitting a dairy calf for show was also given them.

The tour ended at the H. W. Ray thoroughbred horse breeding farm near Hillsboro, where the boys had an opportunity to see the various brood mares and stallions kept by Ray.

Glen Ireland of the Greenview dairy club and John Hansen of the Rock Creek dairy club will broadcast a dialogue describing the Willamette valley 4-H livestock tour over station KEX, Portland, on the "Western Farm and Home Hour," Friday noon. This number is being sponsored for the purpose of creating increased interest in 4-H tours and will be broadcast over stations in Oregon, Washington and California.
