If the field is saved for seed, irrigation insures plenty of moisture for filling the seed. The second hay crop is now ready for harvesting this year and will probably make a ton and a half tons to the acre. Similar results were obtained last year.

Point an Iron Pipe Bears N. 88° 56' W. 30 ft.

North line of said school lot N. 88° 56' W. 45.0 feet to an iron pipe in the center of the County Road No. 100; thence S. 83° 45' W. 56.0 feet to an iron at the northern NW corner of the land of J. E. Shorb in said Section 7, thence S. 10° 23' W. 130.5 feet to a stone at an old established re-entrant corner on the north line of the said Shorb tract; thence N. 88° 32' W. 202.0 feet to a point in Her Creek (from which point a witness iron bears S. 88° 32' E. 19.8 feet) thence S. 2° 34' W. 248.1 feet to an iron pipe; thence N. 88° 46' W. 230.5 feet to the place of beginning, containing 35.385 acres.

Warrens' Farm is Located Three Miles toward Forest Grove from the Thornburg Place and is one of the most diversified projects in the county. A little irrigation was started 15 years ago but intensive use was not begun until 1934.

One centrifugal pump, powered by electricity, lifts water 60 feet from the Gales creek for application to a 20-acre field of ladino clover. This tract was seeded in a nurse with hennepin barley as a nurse crop and the ladino clover pump is carried across a canyon in wood pipe and flume to an eight-acre mixed grass pasture.

A second centrifugal pump, powered by tractor, is pumping water to a 15-acre field of potatoes, mostly Yellow Gems. These were planted in the latter part of April and have been irrigated three times, the last being the latter part of July. Warrens plans to dig the crop late in September. A similar irrigating system is being planned for Warrens to market 140 sacks of potatoes per acre.

Ten acres of ladino clover seeded in the spring of 1934 is irrigated by gravity. A hay crop of one and a half tons per acre has already been harvested this year and prospects are good for a heavy seed yield as a second crop. Another 10-acre tract is planted to common white clover and saved for seed.

In addition to the above crops, Warrens irrigates bulbs late in the spring after blooming. Irrigation increases the growth of the bulbs. Luncheon will be served at the Thornburg farm by the Gales Creek Women's club. Tour of the two county farms will begin immediately after the meal.

Irrigated truck and fruit crops in the Eugene region were visited yesterday in addition to various other projects near Eugene and through the Willamette valley. Tour this morning started near Rickreall at 8:30 a. m.

Expectation that at least 15 purebred and crossed colts would be entered in the showing Saturday afternoon was expressed by Minton. The event is being conducted for the first time this year and ribbons will be awarded.

Entries in the open classes, 4-H club and Future Farmer events are coming in rapidly, indicating that the coming fair will be better than ever. Superintendents in charge of the various departments are as follows: Livestock, R. M. Banks of Banks; Farm Crops and Vegetables, Grange, H. T. Hesse of Hillsboro; 4-H girls, 2, Domestic Science, Mrs. H. W. McDonald of Tigard; Domestic Art, Mrs. Elizabeth M. Vincent of Tigard; Floral, Mrs. Jean Warrens of Forest Grove; Boys' and Girls' Club Work, O. B. Kraus and L. E. Francis.

Members of the fair board include Minton, president and manager; Hesse, first vice-president; Banks, second vice-president.

Mrs. Zola Morgan, deputy county school superintendent, says that everything points to a large exhibit by the 4-H girls at the county fair. Many leaders and others are calling at the office to make inquiries.

since 1930, an increase of 65 per cent in automobile sales and an increase of 39 per cent in the sale of commercial vehicles.

Patrons of the Portland dog races have wagered an aggregate of \$6,625,253 on the bunny-chasers during the past three years, of which only \$5,797,100.85 was returned to the holders of winning tickets.

Patrons of the state library spend approximately \$5000 a year in postage on applications for books and mailing costs in shipping the books from the library and return.

The state highway department has spent a total of \$214,806,154 in the 22 years of its existence. Of this amount \$165,347,483 has gone into road construction, maintenance and administrative expenses.

Workers under the protection of the compensation fund drew an aggregate of \$976,145 for lost time, during the past year, according to the annual report of the Industrial Accident commission. Medical aid to injured workers took a total of \$658,333.85; pensions to permanently injured workers and dependents of workers killed through industrial accidents, amounted to \$803,504 for the year.

Number of licensed real estate brokers in Oregon declined from a peak of 2776 in 1927 to a low of 981 in 1934.

County Engineer and Roadmaster J. W. Barney says considerable progress is being made on the program for rock on unimproved roads and taking people out of the mud. Rock is being taken out by steam shovel for the roads rather than crushed, and Engineer Barney says it makes a fine base material. Finer rock for surfacing will be put on when funds are available. This method saves 60 cents a cubic yard, he said.

Roads being improved in this way include the Knight and Cutler roads near Dilley, road between Blooming to Fern Hill school, Goetze road on top of Iowa Hill, Delplanche road near Roy and the road that comes out by the Alex Chalmers place.
