Business Seen on Firmer Grounds

As the lumber industry moved piecemeal back to productivity last month, business in the Portland area made a corresponding gain, according to the August issue of Commonwealth, Inc., Business Survey. However, lumber was not alone responsible for the fact that the Commonwealth index of Portland business advanced to 66.85 from 56.79 in June. Electric power production and check payments were up more than seasonally while building contracted less than seasonally.

Oregon business, thinks Business Survey, is on much firmer ground this summer than it was at this time last year. Stability is especially impressive when it is realized that NRA's artificial props no longer exist. Despite this, wages and prices have not dropped materially as had been feared by some persons.

the new men if the project is approved by White and the WPA.

An effort to preserve a portion of the ruins of the old capitol as "Pillars of Yesterday" was frustrated when a truck backed into the segment which had already been undercut, and knocked it down.

The first letting of highway contracts under the 1935 allotment of federal funds will be made on September 5 when bids will be received on projects aggregating approximately \$1,500,000. Subsequent lettings will be made at four-week intervals. There is little prospect, however, of the employment of any considerable number of men on road work in Oregon this winter, according to R. H. Baldock, who points out that the rainy season will seriously hamper work west of the Cascades, where most of the work will be concentrated. A few hundred men will be employed at clearing work on such projects as the Wilson river road in Tillamook county and the Wolf creek cut-off in Washington and Columbia counties.

Work on new buildings at four state institutions is being delayed.
