Reservations for Round-Up Heaviest

PENDLETON—Reservations for the Pendleton Round-Up, September 12, 13 and 14, are the heaviest they have been for several years, according to Roy W. Riner, secretary of the Pendleton Round-Up association. A greatly increased interest has been manifested by eastern states, approximately 600 inquiries having been received during the past month from Atlantic seaboard states.

Special trains to the Round-Up are coming from Spokane and Portland this year and, in addition, several special cars to accommodate convention groups taking in the Round-Up have been lined up by the Union Pacific. Possibility of the Round-Up grandstands and bleachers, seating 30,000, being packed to capacity for all three days of the exhibition, is foreseen for several reasons. Freer spending has prevailed this year, summer tourist travel on railroads has virtually doubled and other western exhibitors have enjoyed record-breaking crowds.
