

F. M. Dilles Celebrate 54 Years of Marriage

Mr. and Mrs. F. M. Dilles celebrated their fifty-fourth wedding anniversary with a family reunion at their home Sunday. Local friends gave them a surprise in the nature of a dinner and refreshments August 29, the actual anniversary date.

Mr. Dilles was born in Wisconsin in July, 1860, and Mrs. Dilles was born in Crawford county, Pa., in February, 1862. They were married August 20, 1881, in Rochester, Minn.

Mr. Dilles suffered the loss of a leg in a railroad accident in 1894. They resided for 20 years in Minnesota and went to North Dakota in 1900 where they were among the first frontier settlers. He was in the land locating business for a number of years and then became connected with a large store in Grand Forks, N. D.

The Dilles came west in 1927, spending the first winter in Vancouver, Wash., and then in 1928 came to Hillsboro, where they have made their home ever since.

Five children were born to the union, one son, Oda, being lost during the World War. Surviving children are: Mrs. Saksatchewan Leigh, Portland; Clyde M., Saksatchewan, Can.; Mrs. Grace Kayle, Portland, and Welcome A. Kansas City.
