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Enrollment of high school students in vocational agriculture increased from 1462 in 1933-34 to 1544 in 1934-35, according to Earl H. Cooley, state supervisor for vocational agriculture. Eight more schools are offering this course this year. They include River-ton in Coos county; Boardman, Seaside, The Dalles, Arlington, Scappoose and Crane. At least a dozen other schools applied for the course, but could not get it because of lack of competent instructors.

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
