

Poultry Feeds Meet Subject

Producers Will Gather in Corvallis September 26

Poultry feeding problems will be emphasized at the 12th annual Oregon Poultrymen's convention to be held September 26 in the Memorial Union building at Oregon State college, according to L. E. Francis, assistant county agent, M. Wayne Miller from the Western Washington Experiment station is the visiting specialist on this subject.

Every poultryman in the state, whether a member of the state association or not, is welcome to attend the convention sponsored by the college. Business of the association will be just one part of the proceedings. Following are the subjects, time being provided after each for questions and discussions.

More Action Seen in Slot Machine Drive

Considerable revenue would result to the benefit of the county. Suit has been filed by the Coast Logging company against Harry Sherman, Sherman-Stanwood Lumber company and Nicholson-Neppach Co. of Portland asking judgment of \$114,485 declared due them on contract. Lumber, in which the plaintiff claims an interest, was marketed, it is alleged, by the lumber company under an agreement by which the Portland company was to have paid the money into a Hillsboro bank, allowing the plaintiff thereby to receive his share.

This was not done, the complaint alleges, the money being paid directly to the Sherman company. She is asking damages covering some \$200 for doctor bills and \$13,000 on account of a beer parlor in Aloha, changed his plea in circuit court to an indictment charging assault and battery, from not guilty to the Portland Frank Peters, fined him \$50 on one count of the indictment and postponed sentence on the other. McFarland was given until October 1 to produce the fine.

(Continued from page one) and the first scene is one of luxury and beauty, set in the court of Queen Amense. The queen receives at court, two princes, Sostris of Tyre, a sympathetic and pleasing youth, and Moeris, viceroy of the upper Nile and conspirator to the throne. Queen Amense tries to persuade Remeses to take the throne at once. He is reluctant, but yields when she confides her fear of Moeris.

The third act is effective. The scene in the subterranean chamber of the pyramid, where Remeses is undergoing the initiation rites preparatory to ascending the throne. The rites are portrayed, with the symbols of nature, the Egyptian priests and the high priestess an interesting part of the scene. Remeses is shown a vision of his Hebrew birth, reproduced in the play as a beautiful pantomime.

He returns to the queen, bitter at her deception and repudiates the throne. The queen is broken hearted, but reunites Remeses and his parents, and dies in his arms. The last act is powerful. It is set in the court of Amunophis, who, as Moeris ascended the throne at the queen's death. His cruelty and persecution form the background of this act, serving to emphasize the visitation of the ten plagues, which are realistically portrayed. The end of the play, though portraying the release of the Hebrews, strikes a tragic note in the death of the king's young son.

Throughout the production pagantry, pantomime, dancing and appropriate music are combined with forceful drama to make a spectacular and unusual play. Aid to artistic lighting, costuming and stage setting, the play is expected to reach heights unusual for an amateur production.

Continuation of the control plan for Bang's disease in this county is assured for 1936, according to a letter received this week by the county commissioners from W. H. Lytle of Salem, chief of the division of animal husbandry for Oregon.

The letter points out that \$10,000,000 has been appropriated by the federal government for the federal control plan and that under the present terms of the Oregon control law, the law will not become operative before 1937. No budget allowance for 1936 need be made for this work, the letter says, as the department is in position to have the same type of federal work carried out as has been done this year.

Deer hunters wishing to enter the country ravished by the Tillamook fire will find a considerable portion of that area opened to entry without permit this year, according to an announcement made Wednesday by Cecil Kyle of Forest Grove, district fire warden.

That portion open to entry without permit, lies between range line 6 and 7 west, but because of a hazardous fire season, the country east of this is closed except by permit. Kyle said. He explained that the open territory is a north and south line just west of the summit of the Coast mountains, and between the announced range lines.

FORESTERS STUDYING New Growth in Burn

Survey of the vast Tillamook forest, in which 275,000 acres of choice timber estimated at more than 10 billion board feet were destroyed two years ago, is under way to determine the degree of reseeded and the future benefits to the burn of artificial replanting. The work is being carried on by two junior foresters here from the Pacific Northwest forest experiment station. Work was begun at the north end of the burn in Washington county and will continue south to the limits there, according to reports.
