

Home of Christian Council Dedicated

"To the glory of God, the service of youth, and to the larger patriotism, Pilgrim House stands dedicated." With these closing words, the headquarters of Hillsboro Christian Council and affiliated clubs was officially dedicated by Jake Weil, Hillsboro business man, representing the Jewish faith, one of the four branches of religion whose followers are members of council. Dedication took place last Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock on the house grounds at 232 North Third avenue.

Feature of the afternoon was the brief inauguration ceremony during which Richard Abts, prominent high school student, became president of council. Oath of office was administered by Pastor Henry S. Haller, council advisor. Exercises were opened by invocation, delivered by the Rev. Harry Wilson, local Four-square Gospel pastor, and closed by benediction by Dr. Andrew Carrick, Moderator of Oregon Presbyterian Synod. Senior Vice Commander E. W. Plapp, of the Veterans of Foreign Wars post, presented a large American flag to the council on behalf of the veterans' organization. Greetings and congratulations from Governor Charles H. Martin and President Franklin D. Roosevelt were read by Mayor J. H. Garrett.

"Tolerance does not mean the uniting of all people in one common faith, with all like beliefs," said the Rev. Richard M. Steiner, pastor of the Unitarian Church of Our Father, Portland, during the dedicatory address. "Catholics and Protestants, Jews and Buddhists can still remain true to the faith of their fathers without trying to compel all people to conform to their way of believing. Tolerance through understanding must be the basis of our co-operation."

Before the dedication, council acted to undertake the beautification of the Hillsboro cemetery as a permanent project, and to again gather toys and other gifts for the Coffee club's Christmas party for less fortunate children of the community. These projects will be in addition to the annual Christmas musical festival at the Venetian theatre, and the awarding of the "Galahad Trophy" and "Mary's Rose" to the high school senior boy and girl elected on the basis of "eminence in Christian character." The "Mary's Rose" award will be given this year for the first time.

All clubs affiliated with council acted to undertake the beautification of the Hillsboro cemetery as a permanent project, and to again gather toys and other gifts for the Coffee club's Christmas party for less fortunate children of the community. These projects will be in addition to the annual Christmas musical festival at the Venetian theatre, and the awarding of the "Galahad Trophy" and "Mary's Rose" to the high school senior boy and girl elected on the basis of "eminence in Christian character." The "Mary's Rose" award will be given this year for the first time.
