

Hillsboro Gridmen Swamp Scappoose First Home Game of Season Friday

Locals Defeat Visitors 20-0

Blue and White Team Goes to Rainier This Friday

Heavy, fast-charging line that opened huge holes on offense and proved a stonewall on defense, gave Hilli a 20 to 0 victory over Scappoose here Friday afternoon in the first home game of the 1935 football season. The Blue and White gridmen will travel to Rainier this Friday afternoon for the final practice game.

Launching a powerful ground offensive, the locals marched 60 yards from the kickoff to score the initial touchdown with the game only five minutes old. Garfield and Warner alternated at reverses and end runs to advance the ball to the 18-yard stripe and then Warner crashed over his own right guard to score standing up. Schulerich dropped back from his tackle position and sent the ball spinning through the uprights to add the extra point.

Hilli's second touchdown came early in the second period. Shortly before the close of the first quarter Hillsboro had smashed its way to the Scappoose 18-yard line and Warner punted out of bounds on the 10. The visitors fumbled at the start of the next period and recovered on their own half-yard stripe. Fullback Tufts booting out to his own 32.

Again Garfield, a promising back from last year's reserves, and Warner alternated in packing the ball to the 15. A holding penalty set them back to the 30 and then Warner faded back to pass. The ball sailed 20 into the outstretched arms of Left End Mohr, who took the ball on the run and raced over for the score. Schulerich's try for point was muffed up by a poor pass from center.

The third touchdown might have been termed a break of the game but it was a break that was caused by the continual hitting of the Hilli line. Later in the third quarter Scappoose took possession of the ball on its own 20 after Warner had punted over the goal line. Tufts attempted pass was knocked high into the air and H. Churchley, sub tackle, grabbed the ball and galloped the remaining 18 yards for a score. This time Schulerich's kick was perfect.

Hilli threatened again early in the third when Warner's punt was fumbled on the Scappoose 32 and recovered by Howell, right end. The locals advanced to the 19, where they lost possession of the

ball when an attempted lateral off a reverse went wrong. Scappoose chance came late in the game but the local line successfully held off the threat. Fullback Tufts booted a long punt that sailed over the Blue and White safeties' heads and was downed on the Hillsboro 10-yard line. Chase advanced the ball 13 yards on two plays and then a fumble threw the locals back to their own 9. Another fumble of an attempted punt was recovered by Warner on the half-inch line. Backed up to their own goal line, the Hillsboro line stiffened and Warner punted out to his own 25. Howell intercepted a desperate Scappoose pass a few minutes later and the threat was over.

Performance of the Hilli line was outstanding on offense and defense during the game, particularly the right side where Koslett and Schulerich, two husky linemen, are teamed at guard and tackle. The work of the ends also showed considerable improvement. In the backfield Garfield, Warner and Chase turned in creditable ball-packing performances, while Abts and Torbet showed well in blocking. Particularly outstanding was the improvement in Warner's punting.

Game against Rainier this Friday afternoon is expected to be a tough test for the Blue and White but the locals are determined to keep their goal line uncrossed. Last year the two teams battled to a 7 to 7 tie on the Hillsboro field.

St. Mary's Hi Beats Tigard

Cathlamet High to Battle at Huber Sunday Morn

ST. MARY'S HIGH SCHOOL, Huber—St. Mary's high school eleven won their second game of the season Friday by defeating the heavy Tigard high school team here 7 to 6. It was a hotly-contested game for four periods. Tigard gained 162 yards through scrimmage, while the Saints netted 154, but St. Mary's completed four passes, while Tigard attempts to advance the ball through the air were in vain, as the alert secondary of St. Mary's presented an airtight defense.

existence anywhere that all would be satisfied. Referring to the transactions tax, the congressman declared that there was no use going behind the bush in any of the elements of the question, saying that the transactions tax is a sales tax. Objections to a sales tax only hold, he said, when the income from the tax is to be used for general revenue purposes. Mott said that as a general principle he was opposed to a sales tax on the grounds that the burden fell most heavily on those least able to pay, but that in this case the benefit goes to those who pay, as nine out of ten who pay will benefit when they reach the age of 60. It is not a tax on poverty, it is a tax on rich and poor alike, but the poor get the benefit.

Congressman Mott saw a hope in the audience that the lifelong burden of the poor would be lightened in the winter of life through enactment of the revised McGroarty bill.

Judge John A. Jeffrey of Portland, George Magwood and Rev. Putnam, who presided as president of the local club, and others spoke and urged the support of all in putting over the pension plan. Putnam said the membership should see to it that the movement did not get out of the hands of the individual clubs and expressed the thought that the Townsend groups had formed the best voting force ever organized in this country.
