Both Rainier and Hillsboro made two serious threats during the game, but the Columbia county team held the edge during the tilt. In the first quarter Rainier advanced the ball for a first down on the Hilhi five-yard line but the Blue and White line lived up to pre-season expectations and held for downs. Later in the final stanza the home team pounded its way to the 10-yard line but again lost the ball on downs.

### Bordeaux Spray Effective Used Against Blight

Peach blight and dieback, a general source of grief to Washington county peach orchards, can be effectively controlled with Bordeaux spray applied prior to heavy fall rains. The blight and dieback organisms are usually always present in the peach orchard. When it begins to rain, the drip through the tree reads the disease. Failure to get control by use of this spray is usually due to one of two things. First, poor spray material. Second, ineffective coverage.

Good bordeaux spray may be purchased and used in making this spray at home. This form of lime is all right providing it has been kept so long that it has begun to revert to carbonate form. If hydrated lime is used, even though fresh, it should be dissolved about 24 hours ahead of the time it is going to be used.

Poor coverage may be due to two things--one is that sometimes they just naturally don't get enough spray on the tree, and the other is that sometimes there is enough spray put on the tree, but it isn't put where it will do the most good.

To get this spray on at the time it will afford the greatest protection means spraying before the leaves are off. That means that the leaves will catch a lot of it and that a lot more spray will be necessary than will be required after the trees have shed their foliage.
