

This is to advise you that we will hold you strictly accountable if you solicit or receive for sale any walnuts or filberts grown by any member of any unit of North Pacific Nut Growers, Cooperative.

You or any other dealer who purchases any nuts covered by an existing marketing contract with any unit of this association is liable for an action for conversion, or under the circumstances noted therein, for the penalties provided in Section 25-815 Oregon Code of 1930.

We are writing you this letter at this time so that you will have ample warning. To avoid liability, it is suggested that you make inquiry to determine whether or not nuts that you handle are under existing contracts.

The only reason we can figure out why Mr. Riggs should write such a letter is that he is afraid a good many of his members do not want to deliver their filberts or walnuts to him. The only reason why a member would want to take his filberts or walnuts to somebody else would be if he found out he could get more money for his crop and get his money faster than he could from Mr. Riggs. It must be that a good many members have found this out.

So far we haven't found it necessary to write any threatening letters to Mr. Riggs to keep our growers from going over and selling to him. Maybe you can guess why.

Now wouldn't Mr. Riggs be doing more for his members if he got busy and sold some nuts instead of spending his time blustering and writing threatening letters to us? He signs his name as "Sales Manager." Or does he figure on letting California do the selling?

Furthermore, does Mr. Riggs have a contract with a member when Mr. Riggs has signed an Agreement to give away 30% of the member's walnuts to the California Control Board; unless that member has given his consent? Or hasn't Mr. Riggs himself broken that contract?
