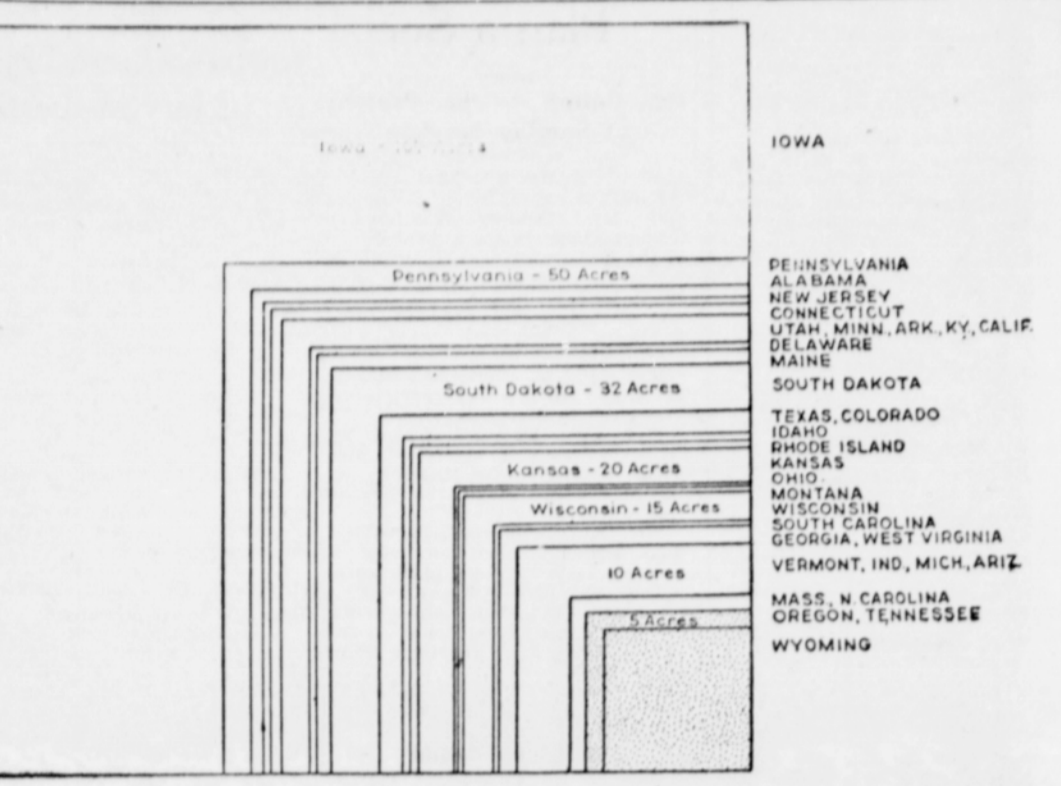

## Only Wyoming Has Smaller Capitol Site Than Oregon



Of thirty-three states in the United States recently answering inquiries as to size of capitol grounds, twenty report adding more land. Wyoming's plot of four acres is smallest in the country and they are adding more land, officials from that state announced. Actual size of the Oregon site on which the former capitol stood is 331 by 600 feet. Application for 45 per cent of the 63,500,000 set as the amount needed for building a new state house for Oregon was recently approved by the United States Government. A supplemental application has been made to PWA asking for aid in obtaining additional ground. States adding more land and their present sizes follow: Arizona, 10; Michigan, 10; Georgia, 11 1/2; Idaho, 22; Arkansas, 40; Indiana, 10; Massachusetts, 6; Montana, 15 1/2; Ohio, 16; Pennsylvania, 50; Rhode Island, 21; South Carolina, 12; Utah, 40; Wisconsin, 15; Virginia, 11 1/2; Tennessee, 5 1/2; Vermont, 10; North Carolina, 6; Wyoming, 4. Average size site for the 48 states is 25 1/2 acres.

## Mrs. Williams' Jerseys High in Herds More Than 20 Cows

Total milk production for September for the Washington county Herd Improvement association was 365,422 pounds with 165,965 pounds of butter fat produced by the 26 herds under test, according to the report of Jake Lorenz, tester. September was the low month and increases are expected from now on.

High test herds included Mrs. Tom Williams' purebred Jerseys in herds of more than 20 cows with 21 cows tested, 675 pounds average of milk and average test of 35.76 pounds fat. In the 12 to 20 cow herds another Forest Grove dairy, Mrs. Robertson & Son, tested 19 purebred Jerseys averaging 615 pounds of milk and testing 34.93 pounds of fat.

The C. H. Bamford herd, also of Forest Grove, was high for herds of 12 cows with nine animals tested averaging 710 pounds of milk and 44.33 pounds of butter fat. The two high cows in the tests again were from the Connell Brothers' herd at Connell, where their No. 39, a purebred Holstein, age 4, produced 1998 pounds of milk with a test of 78 pounds of fat. Another purebred Holstein No. 16, age 3, produced 2070 pounds of milk with a fat production of 72.4 pounds.

Cows producing more than 70 pounds of fat for the month were the two Connell cows and Neewah 7, from the David Hagg & Sons herd at Reedville. This cow is 6 years old, produced 1101 pounds of milk and 70.4 pounds of fat.

Three high cows producing more than 60 pounds of milk were Rose Ann, purebred Jersey, age 8, from Mrs. Robertson & Son herd with 1020 pounds of milk and 67.3 of fat; No. 5, grade Holstein from the Fir Grove Dairy, Hillsboro, age 5, with 1572 pounds milk and 64.4 pounds fat, and Kiawanda, a purebred Jersey 7 years old from the C. H. Bamford herd, with 972 pounds milk and 62.2 pounds fat.

Cows 4 years old making 45 pounds fat included Ruby, purebred Jersey, C. H. Bamford, 837 pounds milk and 61.9 pounds fat;

Bell 12, grade Jersey, David Hagg & Sons, 981 pounds milk and 57.8 fat; Dian 2, Mrs. Tom Williams, purebred Jersey, 831 pounds milk and 55.4 fat; Connell Brothers 30, 18, purebred Holstein, 1365 pounds milk and 50.5 fat; Princess, owned by C. H. Bamford, purebred Jersey, 675 pounds milk and 47.9 fat; Popeye, owned by C. B. Buchanan of Gaston, purebred Jersey, 792 pounds milk and 47.5 pounds fat.

Three year olds making more than 40 pounds of fat were Ash 4, grade Jersey owned by David Hagg & Sons, 828 pounds of milk and 61.2 pounds of fat; Sally 14; Richard Hagg, grade Jersey, 831 pounds milk and 54 of fat; No. 32, Fir Grove Dairy, purebred Holstein, 1533 pounds milk and 53.6 of fat; No. 20, same owner, grade Holstein, 1152 pounds milk and 51.8 fat; unaltd. also a Fir Grove cow, grade Guernsey, 960 pounds of milk and 46 of fat; and Sybil, C. B. Buchanan, grade Jersey, 771 pounds milk and 44.7 fat.

Connell Brothers had two cows in the two-year-old class making 35 pounds of fat: No. 22, purebred Holstein, 2031 pounds of milk and 68.4 pounds fat; No. 34, same breed, 1471 pounds of milk and 51.4 of fat in 27 days; No. 12, owned by Mike Yunkers of North Plains, grade Jersey, made 1423 pounds milk and 51.2 pounds of fat; Judy, owned by C. H. Bamford, 840 pounds milk and 47 fat; Toos 4, David Hagg & Sons, grade Jersey, 861 pounds of milk and 46.5 fat; Ash 5, grade Jersey, same owner, made 729 pounds of milk and 43 of fat while Judy 6, another grade Jersey of the Hagg

herd, made 681 pounds of milk and 42.2 of fat.

Sixteen boarders were detected, six cows reacted to the Bangs test and were sold and one cow died. The report shows 109 cows averaging 40 pounds of fat and 585 cows enrolled with 75 dry.
