### Wheat Acreage for the County Cut Almost One-Half Five Years

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The acreage of wheat in Washington county was reduced 49 per cent between 1929 and 1934, according to the 1935 Federal Farm Census preliminary report released today by Director William L. Austin, Bureau of the Census, Department of Commerce.

Wheat totaled 12,900 acres and 168,087 bushels in 1934 as compared with 25,177 acres and 767,636 bushels in 1929. Hay increased during the last five years from 34,439 acres and 73,080 tons to 41,441 acres and 88,030 tons. The acreage of most of the other crops was very little different in 1934 than in 1929.

Washington county had about 12 per cent more farms and ranches in 1935 than in 1930. There was a decline from 59.9 acres to 52.2 acres in the average size of these farms.
