### Banks Budget Meeting Friday Night; Election November 5

#### Three Councilmen to be Named; Mrs. Moore Honored; Mott Speaks Kansas City Festival; Banks Hi to Play

BANKS—The budget committee will meet Friday evening to consider the proposed city budget, which is as follows: marshal's salary, \$60; attorney, \$50; treasurer's salary, \$30; printing, \$30; recorder, \$300; to retire water bonds, \$2,000; street lights, \$255.60; incidentals, \$900; to retire semi-annual interest, \$500; total \$4,941.60. Estimated income from water rent is \$2,400. This leaves \$2,541.60 to be raised by taxation. The budget committee is J. J. Hutchens, chairman, W. G. Walker, H. L. Jensen, Fred Wolford, Bert Friday and Ralph Wilcox.

**Business Gains Over 1934 Period**  
Business in the Portland area was slightly less active during September than in August but reflected substantial gains when compared with September last year, according to the October issue of Commonwealth, Inc. Business Survey. The Commonwealth index of Portland business dropped a little more than one point in a month, being 72.96 for September, against 73.36 for August and 65.73 for September 1934.

It was pointed out that while most factors used in compiling the index showed gains over August, they were less than seasonal normal gains and a drop in the comparison index thus resulted. Lumber production was substantially the same as during August while electric power production was up 1 per cent and bank debts were up
