#### HOT BREADS FOR EARLY

During the cooler days of early autumn we are tempted to use more hot breads in our menus. Although much has been said about serving hot breads, they do have their place in the diet and give variety to our meals. Molasses and whole wheat flours are good sources of iron and using them in hot breads is a good way to help supply this necessary mineral to the diet.

The good food values of butter, milk and eggs are not altered in the baking of hot breads, so in addition to iron-calcium, phosphorus, vitamins A and G are supplied to the body. Although these food values are not furnished in large amounts they aid in fulfilling the day's requirements. The following recipes you will find, are easily prepared and will give your meals variety.

#### Gingerbread

1 cup molasses  
1/2-cup butter  
1 1/2-teaspoons soda  
1/2-cup sour milk  
2 eggs  
2 cups flour  
2 teaspoons ginger.  
Put butter and molasses in sauce pan and cook until boiling point
