## Long, Dry Spell Aid in Controlling Disease Among Birds on the Range

The long, dry spell through which we have just passed has been very helpful in controlling disease among birds on the range. However, it has had one drawback and that is the fact that disease has been so satisfactorily controlled, that pullets have not acquired adequate immunity from the small intestinal form of coccidiosis (duodenal coccidiosis) which so frequently appears after they have been moved into the laying house. This form of coccidiosis, while it is severe and can very easily result in considerable death loss and decrease in egg production, yet if properly handled, can be readily controlled without any appreciable effect on the flock and its production.  
Coccidiosis is best recognized by the droopy condition of the affected birds and a loss in weight, a condition usually lasting for several days up to a week or two with death occurring during this period.
