Local Boy Tells of Experience in Pacific Typhoon

Neil Richardson, who is on his second world trip, writes his parents, Mr. and Mrs. C. T. Richardson, describing a typhoon encountered while coming out of the Inland sea on the way to Shanghai on September 8:

"The large swell I wrote about turned out to be a typhoon. We got into it about 8:30 last night and have been in it for almost 20 hours now. The waves got to be about 30 feet in height and the old ship is tossing around like a cork. About three-fourths of the passengers are sick and eight or nine of the crew. Dishes and pans are crashing all the time, for it is a real typhoon with all the trimmings. Had to work four hours today, two hours of which I steered and two I stood lookout. No one knows just where we are at present, or when this damned thing will blow over, but one thing is certain, that we will be a good many hours late when we arrive at Shanghai."

Neil later arrived at Shanghai, 34 hours late. He had earlier described a visit to a Japanese tea house and garden one evening in Kobe, as follows:

"As we came up the walk, the leader saw us and invited us in with him. We sat down on the steps and took off our shoes and then were led into a little two by four room. It was regular Japanese style with mats on the floor, low ceilings, and everything. The walls were all sliding and the table was only about a foot off the floor. We had a bowl of some kind of fish or shrimp that we had to eat with chopsticks, then the saki-yaki was brought in and cooked at our table. A Japanese girl cooked all the stuff for us and waited on us. After the meal we walked around the place, and it certainly was beautiful. The walls were lined with spears, armor, guns and shields. Rooms were full of idols and beautiful wood carvings. It was a very large place with a garden around the outside. The place was built in horseshoe shape and in the center was an idol of Diahitsu, before which we had to bow. The garden had many bridges in it and there were several ponds. The whole thing took me back to the time I was studying Japan in school. I had seen pictures of the country and formed my own impressions, but I never expected to see it. It came to me then that I was just in the spot that I imagined was real romance. I was in a foreign country, in a native house, surrounded by native people and customs, standing on the veranda, looking out across the garden with its bridges and idols, with the dim lights reflecting in the pools."
