Rev. Putnam Tells of Townsend Meet

Rev. R. L. Putnam of Hillsboro, one of the local delegates to the national Townsend convention, tells of the big convention in Chicago in the following letter to his family on October 25:

"Well, one day of our great convention is history. My hope is that everyone of you could be here! The attendance exceeded all expectations, even the first day. Nearly 5500 have registered so far and more are expected today. It is the largest convention in the history of our nation to assemble in Chicago or I guess anywhere else in that matter.

They tried to get a larger convention hall but can find none. The Stephens hotel is swamped for the first time and it is the largest in the world.

It would do your heart good to see the crowd. State lines are obliterated and everyone a friend interested in one thing. It is more like our state Christian convention a spirit than anything else.

Every move toward disruption of the movement or that may be thought to be is squelched right now. There seems to be insurgents at the convention, but Senator Aruckle, chairman, is a master with the gavel. Dr. Townsend asked that he be allowed to preside in his stead as he (Townsend) wanted to meet the people. Senator Aruckle is handling every session with order and dispatch.

The keynote address by Dr. Vander of N. Y. was a wonder. Dr. Clements and Dr. Townsend spoke last night. Both of them were given a wonderful ovation by the jammed hall of people, and a rising vote of confidence given them, too.

It has been warmer here so far than at home. We did not need an overcoat yesterday. Bob and I like our hotel room (\$125 each per day). It would have been \$2 at the Stevens hotel. About half the Oregon delegation is in this hotel.

Bro. Young has been to Chicago before and knows what it means to know the ins and outs so he has been instrumental in getting deflation prices for meals and on the rain he arranged with the U. P. officials to get our hotel accommodations before we got here. He really has been a big help to the Oregon delegation, who did not have reservations in advance."

Mr. Helms' illness was brief. He suffered from the flu Thursday and Friday and, although the sickness left him very weak, he seemed on the road to recovery.

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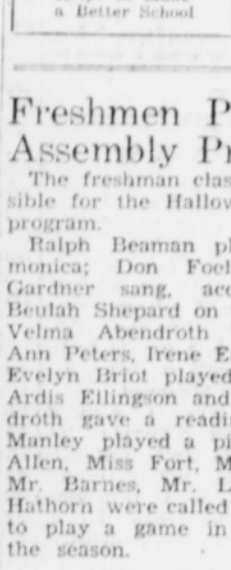
