(Continued from page one) erous funds handled by the treasury department aggregate nearly \$10,000,000, most of which is lying idle in banks without earning any interest.

Petitions for three initiative meals will soon be in circulation about the state. These include the proposed constitutional amendment requiring annual elections, sponsored by W. P. Wagner of Portland, and the state power bill and state bank bill, both sponsored by the State Grange and Federation of Labor. Ballot titles for all three have just been completed by Attorney General VanWinkle.

A commission of seven members will supervise construction of the new capitol building, if the legislature adopts the recommendations of its capitol reconstruction committee. The members of the state board of control will constitute three members of the committee, while the other four members will be selected by the house and senate.

This commission will select the architect and decide the type of building as well as fix its definite location, all within certain limitations to be established by the legislature. So far it seems to be taken for granted that the new state house and its furnishings and equipment will cost in the neighborhood of \$3,500,000 with the federal government putting up 45 per cent of the amount and the state the remaining 55 per cent of the total. Out of this total the legislature may authorize the commission to spend up to 10 per cent—possibly 15 per cent—of PWA is agreeable—for additional land for the new building.

Discussion of sites has now simmered down to the old site and the old site with additions. This latter would include either the Willamette university campus or several residential blocks just north of the state property with a lively

One of the defects of the present scheme of things, he said, is the halter which is placed on the dairy industry by lack of green pastures during the dry summer months.

Another possibility pointed out is the production of vegetables. These products, he declared, could be canned in vast quantities and find a ready market, furnishing a huge income to the area as a whole.

Another possibility is the flax industry. In the east, Dodson remarked, they cannot understand why an area such as this in which flax will grow to such advantage, should not be under development.

Paper pulp came in for a review, with Dodson telling how influential groups in the east were doing everything possible to retard the development of the paper pulp industry on the Pacific coast.
