India Pictures Shown Sunday

"All Colored Close-Up View of the Real India" is the title of a visual lecture to be given Sunday evening at the Methodist Episcopal church by the Rev. Dr. William B. Norton of Portland. Dr. Norton is an author and world-traveler. The pictures to be shown here are from a collection of 3000 taken by Dr. Norton during a long stay in India. These pictures are said, by many qualified to pass judgment, to be the best collection ever to have been brought back to this country by an American traveler. Elephants, holy men and scenes which, according to Dr. Norton, only a few Americans have ever been privileged to witness will be among the collection. A boy who was taken from a den of wolves, where he had been nourished by the wolves, just as Kipling describes in his Jungle Tales, will be shown. These pictures have been shown in Washington, D. C., and in the great churches of Chicago, where they were received with manifest favor. The Honorable James Hamilton Lewis, United States senator, said: "I came to the Methodist Temple (Chicago) to hear you deliver your lecture on India. I have some knowledge of the country and the people through travel and

I was anxious to get your view from an educational point of view. I beg to say that your lecture was not only instructive to me as a matter of history and geography, but your lantern slides and illustrations were an entertainment that would have compensated anyone who had no other interest than the pleasure of beholding the interesting scenes from a mysterious country."

No admission will be charged, the public is invited to view these unusual pictures and a silver offering will be taken for the work of the Methodist Episcopal church in India.
