and he was unable to right it in time to avoid the crash. W. Ober, of Seaside, father of young Ober, testified how he had questioned the Laughlin girl as to whether or not she had interfered with the driver. He said she told him that she could not remember whether she hit the wheel or not.

Tongue attacked the testimony of witnesses in the rear of the truck who declared that the speedometer was checked from the back of the truck and that a speed of 53 miles an hour was being maintained.

H. L. MacKenzie, Hillsboro Ford dealer, testified as to the height of bumpers, to increase the capacity of the truck. The defense claimed that the boards were so high that the speedometer could not be seen from the rear without special effort.

Tongue attacked the alleged reckless speed of the truck with testimony given by Woodrow Epling, a brother of the deceased, who, under questioning, admitted that he had been driving the truck previously and that he had only been able to get a speed of 50 miles per hour.
