Local Schools Complete Child Physical Tests

Teachers at Junior high, Peter Boscow and David Hill schools have completed the annual inspection required by law, according to Superintendent C. H. Nosler, so that each child in the grades has been weighed, measured and had vision checked.

First and fifth grade children will have added advantage of an examination by one of the six Hillsboro physicians who are all giving time for this purpose. Physicians will be assisted by a committee of the Parent-Teacher association with Mrs. J. W. Barney, chairman, and Miss Margaret Dixon, R. N., county nurse.

By reaching these two grades each year, each child will have two examinations during his stay in school and because of limiting the number, the result should be more satisfactory. Due to the employment this year by the school board of two physical education teachers the examinations will have a very practical value. Parents will be informed of defects which can be corrected, either by note or by a visit to the home, so there may be a clear understanding of what the doctor actually recommends.

Corrective exercises will be a part of gymnasium work in the hope that weakened arches may become strong and poor posture a thing of the past.

Parents are urged to be present and an effort will be made to limit the time of waiting as much as possible.
