Easy Game Won; Vernonia Opponents This Week

(By Mrs. F. L. Browne) HUBER-On a hard and fast field here last Friday, St. Mary's high school football team coasted to an easy 38-to-2 victory over the Gervais high school eleven. A veritable gale, sweeping over the field, nullified the Saints' aerial attack, but the foot-fisted St. Mary's backs six times swept down the gridiron for touchdowns.

St. Mary's scored on the first scrimmage play of the game. Gervais received the kick-off but after three vain attempts to pierce the line punted to Webb, who returned the ball to the 35-yard mark. The Saints lined up in a twinkling and the ball was passed to Hughes for a wide-end run. Barkley spilled the savagely-charging Gervais end, who nevertheless managed to check Hughes. Johnny faltered slightly, then cut back in the opposite direction. Meanwhile the entire St. Mary's team had formed a flying wedge that was chopping a swath through half a dozen Gervais opponents. Betman's magnificent line of interference Johnny went into high gear, side-stepping, dodging and shaking off every would-be tackler until he had a clear field to himself. From there on a touchdown was certain as nothing so fast as this tow-headed back has ever run loose on the St. Mary's gridiron.

This brilliant feat stunned the Gervais boys, who never seemed able to recover from the shock. The result was that St. Mary's crossed the Gervais goal line five more times. Not once during the matinee did the Marion county lads register a first down from scrimmage.

This week-end St. Mary's will meet the heavy Vernonia loggers on a home field. A battle royal is expected as Vernonia has managed to strike the colors of the Saints last year. In the hope of keeping a clean slate and making it seven straight, Coach Robinson will open his bag of tricks for the enjoyment of the fans.

On the first play Fullback Bielman fumbled and lost 17 yards to his own 11. He was hurt on the play and taken out, leaving the Beavers without a punter or experienced fullback. Halfback Klein took the next pass from center, but bobbled the ball and lost to the one-yard line. His attempt to kick out was blocked and Mohr fell on the ball for a touchdown. Schulerich converted.

After the kickoff the Beaver attack was again smothered and fullback Barry punted to Wahner, who was finally downed on the Beaverton 31. Torbet picked up nine yards on a wide end run and then Wahner squirmed through the line and raced 23 yards for a score. Again Schulerich booted the leather between the uprights to convert.

Hilhi continued the attack after the half and immediately drove to the Beaverton 19, but lost the ball on downs. Barron attempted to punt on the first play, but the ball was knocked into the air and intercepted by Stunkard on the Beaverton 28. With the goal in sight, Hilhi went to work. Wahner hit center for five, Chace picked up one at end, Wahner added three at center and then lanted over the weak side for 19 yards and a score. Beaverton was offside on the first conversion attempt and Wahner patted the ball over for the extra point.

Beaverton then started a desperate passing attack and carried the ball from its own 33 to the Hilhi 39 on an 11-yard run by Klein and a 16-yard pass from Barron to Barry. Barron was smothered for 17 yards on a pass attempt and the attack bogged down. The Hilhi line shifted through and blocked Barry's punt and Hillsboro recovered on the Beaverton 36.

A few plays later Garfield's punt was blocked and the Beavers went to work from their own 23. Three passes fell incomplete, but Beaverton was given a first down on their own 30 when Hilhi was penalized for roughing the kicker.

Klein heaved an 11-yard pass to Barry for a first down, the next three attempts were unsuccessful. Hilhi patted the ball from its own 43 to the Beaver 38 and then Garfield punted over the goal line.

With only minutes to go Beaverton made a last desperate attempt to score. Klein gained nine at center and then made a first down on the 39. Barron then passed to Wheeler for an 11-yard gain and a first down on the 43. Barron lost seven yards on the next pass attempt. Barron then heaved a nine-yard pass to Klein and a 15-yard heave to Whiting as the game ended.

Beaverton was seriously handicapped in the game by the loss of its fullback, Emmons, who had been the principal ground-gainer and defensive star. Emmons suffered a leg injury and was unable to play.
