ALEM - Oregon's new capitol will rise on the ashes of the pld. Thus decreed the legislators in the closing minutes of the spe-cial session, shortly before mid-night last Saturday.

The decision represents a com-plete surrender of the house mem-bers to the will of the senate expressed in a bill drafted the day before when they tore the report of their conference committee shreds and almost entirely rewrote the capitol reconstruction measure

The bill as finally approved by the house and senate is almost identical with one introduced by Senator Fisher of Roseburg earlier in the session. In addition to limiting the site to the old location, the measure also restricts expenditure on the new state house to \$2,500,-000, including furnishings and fixtures. Supervision of the construc-tion program will be left to a commission of nine members, three to be named by Governor, three by President Corbett of the senate and three by Speaker Latourette of the

The eapitol reconstruction program as adopted by the legisla-ture represents a clean-cut defeat of the program recommended by Governor Martin, which empha-sized the need for a larger site and the expenditure of \$3,500,000. Of the \$2,500,00 to be spent on the new state house 45 per cent, or \$1,125,000 will be provided by Uncle Sam as an outright grant, the remaining 55 per cent or \$1,-375,00 to come out of the general fund of the state.
