direct promotion and expenses of the movement. The audit is published quarterly in the official organ, The Townsend Weekly. Furthermore, the auditor revealed, neither Dr. F. E. Townsend, founder, nor R. Earl Clement, co-founder of the movement, handle the funds. Both these men are allowed \$74 per week salary for each and \$53 per week for expenses.

The 7,000 delegates and friends who attended the convention were so well satisfied with the honesty and leadership ability of its leaders that unbounded confidence and a pledge of loyalty was given them. These facts, among many other things, were told the local club by the delegates, Robert Kelly, Rev. Henry Young, and R. L. Putnam, president.

Robert Kelly was placed in charge of the young people's auxiliary to the local club. He and several other young men were instrumental in getting the auxiliary started among the young people through consultation with Dr. F. E. Townsend in Chicago.

Further report of the convention will be given at the next club meeting November 24 at the M. E. church.

made. The present baseball park would be kept for future development of recreation facilities.
