## Puget Sound Team to Play

### Four Seniors to Play Last Game for Badgers

PACIFIC UNIVERSITY, Nov. 20.—Four Badger seniors will go into action for the last time at 2 p. m. Saturday, when Pacific university meets the College of Puget Sound in the homecoming game on the Forest Grove campus. The game will not only be the last game in the football careers of these four, but it will also climax a hard-fought season and be the high spot in a great homecoming week-end.

The game will be the only one played at home this year and so Coach Anne Cornell is priming the boys to display them to Washington county at their best. Vigorous workouts this week will seek to strengthen the defense that held Willamette Bearcats to a 13 to 0 score Armistice day. They are also preparing an offensive designed to swamp the Loggers as effectively as did Gonzaga, 30 to 12, last Saturday.

Playing their last game will be three four-year veterans: Captain Jim Corrigan, fullback; Don Fosatti, guard, and Frank O'Neill, right half. Bob Main, reserve end and a two-year letterman, is also a senior this year. There is only one senior among the invading Loggers' first string, Jesse Brooks, fullback.

The Badgers have met the Tacoma school 12 times with Pacific having the edge on wins. The last victory was in 1931, the Loggers winning in 1932 and 1933 and the teams tying 7 to 7 last year. Comparative scores this season, which give P. U. S. the advantage in Albany and Whitman games, are theoretically off-set by Pacific's better showing against Willamette and the fact that they will be playing on their own field.

The homecoming program is expected to attract many alumni during the two days. Friday's program includes campus clean-up by the student body in the morning and a giant noise parade in the evening before a rally around 7 o'clock at which freshmen have been building all this week. The rally events will be followed by an all-college presentation of "The Brat," a three-act comedy.

Freshmen and upper-classmen will clash Saturday morning in the traditional inter-class tussle with tug-of-war, bag rush and general free-for-all. Alumni will meet at noon in McCormick hall for their annual dinner and after the game will have an informal meeting in the hall. The final event of the celebration is a dance in the college gymnasium at 8:30, which is sponsored by the associated students. Music will be by Burke's orchestra of Portland.

## Saints Defeat Cottage Grove

### Season to End Thanksgiving with Scappoose Game

HUBER, Nov. 17.—The bells of St. Mary's again pealed the chimes of victory as the battling Saints came home from Cottage Grove today with the scalp of the roaring Lions safely tucked in their belts. It was the first time a Tualatin valley team had ever invaded the Cottage Grove field and some 900 local rooters were on hand to see their pride and joy end the season by putting a crimp into the winning record of the Saints. But when the referee's whistle died away the scoreboard read: St. Mary's 13, Cottage Grove 7.

A heavy rain the night before made the field a veritable quagmire, and the hefty Lions with "Brick" Mason as the spearhead of their attack, plowed through the mud to score a touchdown within the first five minutes of play. The crowd yelled for their favorites, but the Saints braced and the rest of the half was fought on even terms.

The second half told a different story. The Saints took the kickoff and held onto the slippery pigskin until Preciso went over from the seven-yard stripe. Merrill failed to convert, and Cottage Grove still led 7 to 6. The Lions came back strong and carried the ball to the St. Mary's 40-yard line. Here Mason kicked out of bounds on the two-yard mark. It looked as if the Saints would punt immediately, but the canny quarterback, Webb, sent Preciso through the line for seven yards and Stassen around end for six more.

Then came the play that turned the tide. Hughes dropped back in punt formation, but the ball went to Stassen, who sliced off tackle, broke in the clear, and then as the safety was about to tackle him, lateraled to Hughes, who galloped over the muddy turf 50 yards to score. A pass added the extra point.

Cottage Grove made a valiant effort to even the score in the final period, but the St. Mary's secondary broke up their passing attack and the game ended with the ball in St. Mary's possession in midfield.

Riding the crest of an eight-game winning streak the Saints will end the season on Thanksgiving with their traditional rivals at Scappoose.
