gram, which means a contract that covers the wheat crop for the years of 1935, 1937, 1938 and 1939, were discussed fully at six wheat meetings held in the county at as many places approximately two weeks ago.

Farmers generally are turning in applications for new contracts. Apparently about the only ones to drop out are those with a small base which limits their annual wheat acreage to a figure too low for an effective crop rotation practice. There are not very many of these.

Average acreage and production figures for the past period are the same as for the old contract, except where a five-year base is granted in place of a three-year base which was used for the original contract. Growers have the privilege of asking for a five-year base, but the three-year base has been declared standard for Western Oregon conditions and if anything different is granted, the grower must show that the three-year period does not fairly represent wheat production on his farm because of one of the following conditions:

1. That due to a crop rotation practice his acreage in wheat varies widely from year to year and that one or two years of the base period happened to be those times when because of this rotation system, his acreage was small.
2. That his acreage of wheat during one or more years of the base period was less than his usual planting because weather conditions over which he had no control prevented seeding.

These are just about the only two conditions which would entitle the grower to a different base period than the standard three-year plan which was and will be used again.

Wheat allotments are on the land and do not follow the farmer. In other words these contracts do not pass from one piece of property to another but are assumed by new operators or new owners. This fact is probably not too generally understood. Benefit payments are paid to the man who grows the crop. In other words to the man upon whom the responsibility for compliance falls.

Red Cross Worker Stresses Needs

Miss Deborah Pentz of San Francisco, Red Cross field representative for the western division, met with the county chapter Tuesday evening at the chamber of commerce rooms.

Miss Pentz gave an informal talk about the achievements of the Red Cross, and answered questions in regard to Red Cross problems in the county. She spoke of the possibility of placing first aid stations along the highway in order that fatalities might be averted by giving aid while waiting for a physician. State traffic officers, she said, often cooperate in this work by advising on good sites for the stations.
