

# Schulmerich Talks on Taxes at B. & P. Meet

Edward Schulmerich, president of the Commercial National Bank, was the speaker at the Business and Professional Women's meeting Friday night at the chamber of commerce rooms, "Taxes" being his subject. Mr. Schulmerich said there would be no privileges without taxation, and if the selfishness could be wiped out of the human heart, our tax problems would be solved.

He said that the proportion of taxes borne by incomes should be about one-third of the total, as there is no basis on which to prepare the income tax, and that it couldn't be collected other than from one year to another. Budget must be levied on fixed values, therefore he thought real property should carry two-thirds of the taxes. Mr. Schulmerich said that the first year taxes would be levied on incomes half of the income taxes were paid by persons who had never been on the tax rolls, thus proving the value of the income tax.

He spoke in favor of the sales tax, saying that you had to have the money before you paid it, and that it couldn't be collected otherwise. There are 2600 tax-paying bodies in Oregon, according to the speaker. Be citizens, be patriots, he admonished members of the club, as the greatest duty anyone can do is to raise other citizens to a higher plane.
