

## Christmas Seal Sale to Start Here Friday

Annual sale of Christmas seals, proceeds of which are used in the campaign against tuberculosis, will start in Washington county Friday, according to Mrs. Harry R. Morgan of Hillsboro, county chairman. A quota of at least one seal per capita has been set in this area. All funds raised locally will be used in Oregon, excepting five per cent. to finance disease control work in addition to and in co-operation with the medical and public health nursing work financed by county courts and other agencies. Mrs. Essex Marsh, president of the Washington County Public Health association, reports. The five per cent goes to the National Tuberculosis association for medical research and other activities from which Oregon will also benefit. Seals have already been distributed to chairmen in the various districts. The sale will begin Friday and continue until Christmas. Members of the Legion Auxiliary, with Mrs. A. H. Busch and Mrs. Jake Well at their heads, have charge of the seal sale in Hillsboro, assisted by the two Camp Fire Girls groups, Wahkeena and Lohe. They will have booths in the stores on Saturdays.
