Beginning next Sunday the hour for the preaching service will be changed from 11:30 a. m. to 8 p. m.

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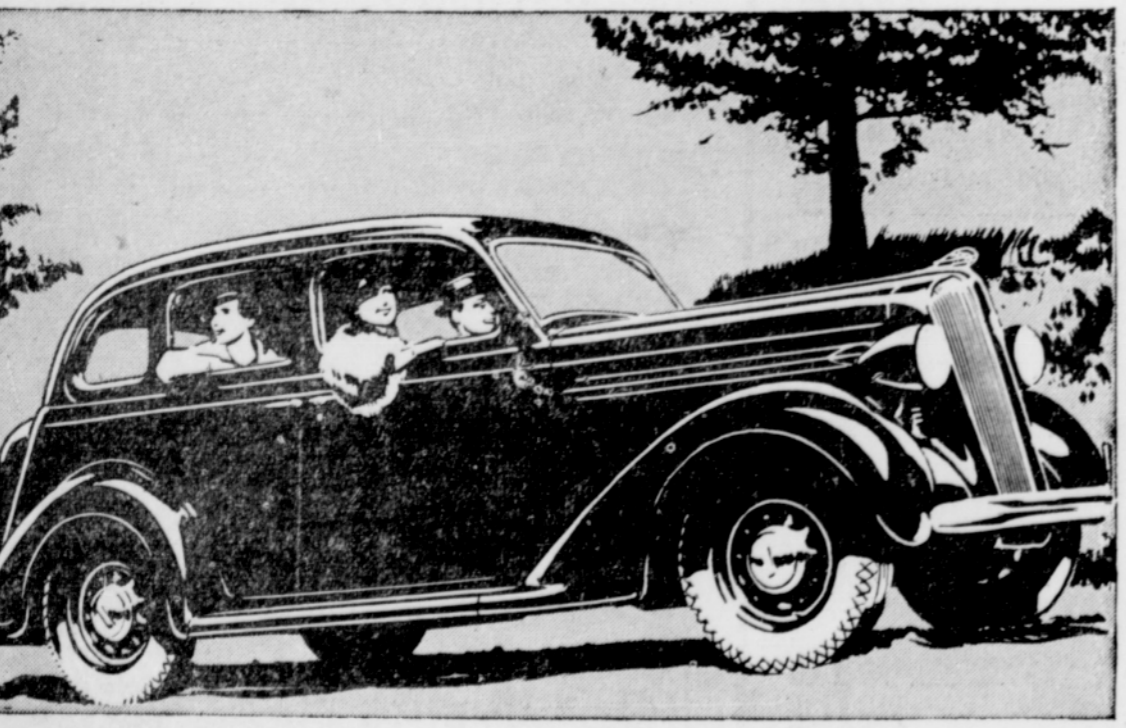
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
