

Seek Damages for Indictment

Three Arrested Two Years Ago Sue Groner Firm

Three court actions for damages involving \$5,000 in each action, filed in Multnomah county against Ferd Groner, Frank Rowell, other members of the Groner Walnut company and Carl Wohlschlegel, was brought to Washington county circuit court this week on change of venue.

Action was brought by Robert F. Heintz as guardian of John Hoffert and Adam Heintz and by Peter Heintz, all of Portland, charging false arrest, indictment and injury to character subsequent indictment and prosecution. This suit follows the arrest of Peter and Adam Heintz and John Hoffert at 2 o'clock the morning of February 18, 1933, as they were loading wood at the company woodpile.

They were apprehended by Carl Wohlschlegel, watchman, the complainant reads, and forced to stand in his house with their hands in the air until officers arrived at 4 o'clock Hoffert, who was with the Heintz boys, was freed by the grand jury on testimony that he was merely accompanying them and not engaged in moving the wood.

A local circuit court jury later found the boys not guilty of a larceny charge. They testified that they were working for their father and had been directed to take the wood as he had purchased it from the Groner company. They hauled

NOTICE OF HEARINGS ON PETITIONS FOR THE FORMATION OF THE NORTHWEST OREGON BONNEVILLE PEOPLES' UTILITY DISTRICT

Notice is hereby given that seven separate public hearings will be held by the Hydroelectric Commission of Oregon at the times and places hereinafter indicated to consider voters' preliminary petitions in support of the advisability of creating a preliminary utility district. Such district would include portions of the counties of Clackamas, Clatsop, Columbia, Lincoln, Polk, Washington and Yamhill and the following municipalities: Oregon City, West Linn, Oswego, Milwaukie, Gladstone, Sandy, Estacada, Barlow and Molalla in Clackamas County; Astoria, Seaside, Warrenton, Gearhart and Hammond in Clatsop County; Lytle, Clatskanie, Columbia City, Goble, Rainier, Seapoose, St. Helens in Lincoln County; Banks, Beaverton, Cornelius, Hillsboro, Sherwood, Dayton, Dundee, Lafayette, Newberg, Sheshan, Willamina and Yamhill in Yamhill County; Dallas, West Salem, Falls City, Monmouth and Independence in Polk County. The municipalities of Forest Grove in Washington County, Canby in Clackamas County and McMinnville in Yamhill County are not included.
