 course should have been announced along about the first of the present month.

If Allen retires as liquor administrator, as he probably will, it will be entirely of his own accord and in the interest of harmony within the organization. Allen is known to have clashed repeatedly with members of the liquor commission, who have persisted in making his position uncomfortable by stripping him of various duties from time to time and conferring them upon Runtle and Eugene Kelly, who is said to be the liquor administrator in fact although Allen bears the title. Allen was in Salem during the busy days of the recent special legislative session and is understood at that time to have offered to resign, but agreed to remain at the insistence of the governor.

Since that time, however, W. L. Goss, the governor's secretary, is said to have paid Allen a "purely social call" during which he suggested the advisability of the administrator's retirement. Friends of Allen among the democratic leadership of the state by that time, however, had rallied to his support and insisted upon his sticking by his guns, which he has done so far—long enough to convince the public at least that he can stay indefinitely if he wants to.

Should Runtle's promotion to the liquor administratorship materialize it will be over the strenuous protests of many influential democrats with whom the chief investigator is not at all popular and the situation thus created would hold ample promise of future disturbances in liquor control circles.

 which has been providing employment for 43 women working in Forest Grove, Hillsboro, Aloha, Beaverton, Tigard and Sherwood and was shut down this week, not to be reopened until a new project is approved.

Reason for the shut down was attributed to the fact that the federal administration appropriated 40 per cent of money allotted to women's projects for materials, cutting the working time of the projects nearly in half. The funds remaining have been exhausted, it is said.

The new project is scheduled to open for 72 months and will employ nearly 70 women instead of 43. If the Portland office of WPA approves funds for operation, it is expected that the project will be resumed sometime after the first of the year.

A total of 20 projects are in operation in all parts of the county, Tillotson said.

With a steady reduction in state levies against property Governor Martin wants that within a few years property will pay no tax at all for state purposes within the six per cent constitutional limit. This year's property levy for state purposes other than to meet special millages, he points out, is less than \$900,000 whereas only a few years ago it totalled \$3,500,000.

Governor Martin is expected to announce the appointment of a new game commissioner this week to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Wallace, who was wanted to regain his seat in the house and lost out by only one vote.
