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Public Lectures Start at Pacific

"Mathematics, the Universal Language" will be the subject of the opening lecture in a series of lectures to be given by members of Pacific university faculty once a month during the rest of the school year. The speaker on this occasion will be Dr. Henry Ferris Price, professor of mathematics, and dean of the college.

This first lecture will be held at 8 p. m. January 16, in room 616 of Marshall hall, which is the main administration building on the Pacific campus.

These lectures are open to the general public, without charge for admission, and are part of an educational service which the college is rendering to this community and to Washington county in general. Last year this series of public lectures proved quite popular.

Among the speakers last year were Professors Smith, Taylor, Jones, Watson, Fitch, Gunn and Odgers. Their subjects covered such varied topics as "The Balkan Situation," "Optical Chemistry," "The Relation of Philosophy to Other Fields of Knowledge," "The Use and Meaning of Words in Advertising," "Light Waves," and "The Values of Classical Culture." The university committee on faculty lectures has promised that there will be the same variety of subjects this year, and that, however technical the material may be, it will be presented in an interesting and popular form.
