

W. J. Wismer Buried Monday

Resident of County Many Years Dies Saturday

Walter Jacob Wismer, 69, died early Saturday after an illness of many years. Funeral services were held Monday afternoon from the Bethany Presbyterian church with Rev. H. G. Dickman officiating. Burial was in the church cemetery.

Mr. Wismer was born near Duquoin, Iowa, June 30, 1866, the son of Mr. and Mrs. Jacob Wismer. At the age of four years he moved with his parents to Milwaukee, Wis., where they resided for a short time, then moved by wagon train to Yankton, S. D., where his father homesteaded. At the age of seven he came to Oregon by way of San Francisco and settled at Bethany. In 1897 he married Laura Held of Estacada and they made their home at Rock Creek, where he lived for 32 years. In 1929 he left the farm due to ill health, and moved to Hillsboro, where he spent his last years.

Four children were born to this union, the youngest dying in infancy. Surviving are the widow, Mrs. Laura Wismer, and three children: Mrs. Deborah Leu, Miss Ophele Wismer and Mrs. Leila Adams, and five grandchildren. The following brothers and sisters also survive: Mrs. Louise Dysle, Otto Wismer and John Wismer, all of Hillsboro; Carl Wismer, Bethany; Mrs. Freda Erickson, Portland; Mrs. Ida Von Gruenzen, Artesia, Cal.

Non-High Board Approves Claims

Transportation and tuition claims for the first semester totaling \$30,889.50 were approved Tuesday night by the county non-high board. Tuition claims of the seven high school districts amounted to \$20,184.50, while transportation amounted to \$10,685.

Claims approved were as follows: Banks, \$1540 transportation, \$1743 tuition; Tigard, \$2265 transportation, \$2343 tuition; Hillsboro, \$3000 transportation, \$4493 tuition; Forest Grove, \$300 transportation, \$1073 tuition; Tualatin, \$212.50 tuition; Beaverton, \$3180 transportation, \$7920 tuition; and Portland, \$1500 tuition.

Coast Road Plea Rejected by WPA

Used for county road building and maintenance, and urging adoption of the Wolf creek and Wilson river highway programs as WPA projects.

Debate on the federal ruling limiting eligibility for WPA and WPA employment to those on relief lists prior to November 1, 1935, took up a large part of the session. Judges and commissioners from Oregon's 36 counties went on record opposing the plan and contending that the county courts should have a right to determine the eligibility of relief clients.

Short cut routes were backed for the purpose of fire protection, providing work for unemployed and on the contention that it was needed by two-thirds of the state. Discussion was also conducted concerning the hiring of an attorney to represent the counties on a full time basis, but no action was taken.

Matter of the Wolf creek and Wilson river projects was presented at the state highway commission session Friday by Portland City Engineer Apperson. He urged that work on the routes be speeded up, but highway commissioners declared that they had no means of financing the projects more rapidly. They stated, however, that they were receptive to all suggestions of WPA projects, but could not favor one against the other.

Bid of \$16,242 for an undercrossing under the railroad at Metzger was awarded to Saxton & Looney and J. S. Risley, Portland, by the highway commission. The matter was referred to the engineer for final award.
