Byrd's Antarctic Expedition at the Venetian theater last of the week will be interested in knowing that an exact reproduction of the medal which was presented Admiral Byrd by the American Guernsey Cattle Club has been presented to Sam Hulit and Sons of the Morning-Dead thing gets life.

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for what you have done and are doing for Guernseys."

There were only 200 of these medal replicas given out in the United States and only 20 in the seven western states.

The dairy herd was started at Little America at the request of Admiral Byrd for a Guernsey to accompany the expedition in order that fresh milk might be had. Three Guernseys were taken on the expedition, Deerfoot's Guernsey Maid, Foremost Southern Girl, and Klondike Gay Nira. On December 19, 1933, Nira gave birth to Iceberg, the famous Guernsey bull, who was born within 247 miles of the Antarctic Circle, aboard the Steamer Jacob Ruppert. Iceberg lays claim to having been born farther south than any other dairy animal in the world. The first check on Nira's milk showed that she was producing 42½ pounds of milk, and

the other two cows gave 40 pounds each a day.

The medal presented to the Morning Dairy is exhibited in the Argus window.
