#### CHICKEN POX

(By Oregon State Board of Health)  
Chicken pox is an acute disease with slight fever and mild constitutional symptoms. The eruption consists of raised red spots no larger than the size of a pea. It may last for a few hours and is not often observed. These red spots develop into vesicles or small blisters which last for three or four days and leave a granular scale. The eruption develops abundantly on the covered parts of the body as on the exposed parts, and frequently appears in different stages on the same region.

Chicken pox is caused by a filterable virus, and is transmitted directly from person to person or indirectly through articles soiled by discharges from infected persons. All articles soiled by discharges from lesions should be boiled or disinfected. The disease is especially communicable in the early stages of the eruption. It is one of the most readily communicable diseases. It is probably not communicable more than six days after the appearance of the first crop of vesicles and certainly not more than 10 days. Practically all those who have not had the disease are susceptible. With rare exceptions an attack confers permanent immunity. A temporary immunity may be conferred by the use of convalescent serum from those recently recovered.

Over 90 per cent of all persons who have had the disease by the time they are 15 years of age. It is not uncommon in early infancy. Winter and spring are the seasons of greatest prevalence. The disease should be recognized early and reported.

### State Capital News Letter

Governor Says Relief a Local Problem, Not Federal

State police arrested 672 motorists for traffic law violations during December, according to the monthly report of Superintendent Charles P. Pray. Warning slips were issued to 9361 other motorists detected in minor traffic law violations.

A. M. Dalrymple of Salem and Howard Latourette of Portland aspire to succeed Walter M. Pierce as the democratic national committeeman from Oregon. Dalrymple was warden of the state prison under the Pierce administration and Latourette was speaker of the house of representatives at the recent special session of the legislature.

From Portland come reports that C. B. Thomas, former utilities commissioner, is being groomed as a candidate for the republican nomination for United States senator against Senator Charles L. McNary, who will be a candidate to succeed himself. Thomas, so the report goes, will depend largely upon support from the Townsend movement in his efforts to unseat Oregon's senior senator. The grooming of Thomas, it is understood, is being supervised by Henry Hansen, former state budget director.

Seeking the democratic nomination for United States senator will be Willie Mahoney, Klamath Falls mayor, who has also been playing strongly to the Townsend galleries in his search for political support. Mahoney, however, does not appeal strongly to the regulars in the democratic camp, who have not yet forgotten his desertion to the republican camp following his defeat in the last gubernatorial primary.

Between 200,000 and 250,000 men and women employed in 18,000 Oregon industries will come under the provisions of the new unemployment compensation act, it is estimated by T. Morris Dunne of the industrial accident commission, who has been making a careful study of this phase of the social security problem.

The short term, which Rufus C. Holman served as state treasurer under appointment prior to his election to the office, is no bar to a second term in the office if the people elect him. That is the ruling of Attorney General VanWinkle. The opinion contradicts political

speculation to the effect that Holman was not eligible to succeed himself for another term under the constitutional provision which limits certain state officials to not more than eight years out of 12 in the same office. In addition to the attorney general's ruling Holman has plenty of precedent for seeking reelection. Ben W. Olecott and Sam A. Koger both were appointed to the post of secretary of state prior to their election and both were re-elected to second terms.

Rufus C. Holman, state treasurer, reports the recovery of \$3914 in traffic fines due the state from justice courts through the activities of a field auditor recently employed to check up on this item.

As was expected Oregon's recently enacted unemployment insurance law has been formally approved by the National Security board, making Oregon the first state to conform to this section of the new national security act. Prospect of a suit to test the validity of the federal act, however, will cause the industrial accident commission to move slowly in getting the new act into effect. The validation of the federal act leave the state out on a limb with a big organization and no money with which to meet the payroll. Defects discovered in the state act are not believed to be serious. Inclusion of a provision for employee contribution to the insurance fund, it is pointed out, was due to a clerical error, both the house and senate journals showing that this section had been deleted from the measure before final passage. It may require a majority of two-thirds in the legislature to correct this error, but little fear is felt here as to the ultimate result since the Oregon supreme court has always in the past followed what is known as the journal entry rule rather than the enrolled bill rule in arriving at the intent of the lawmakers.

Sand and gravel companies attempting to evade royalty payments in the future will be halted into court for an accounting, the state land board warned this week. Sand and gravel royalties of 10 cents a cubic yard go into the state's common school fund. Law enforcement of collections in the past has cost the school fund many thousands of dollars in the opinion of State Treasurer Holman, who has been instrumental in securing the services of two special investigators to probe into the books of companies taking sand and gravel from Oregon streams. These investigations have already resulted in the recovery of several thousand dollars to the school fund.

cure the cancellation. Every year thereafter, the current tax must be paid in full, together with one quarter of the delinquent tax. In case the current tax is paid in installments, no quarter of the current tax may be allowed to become delinquent and the payment on the delinquent levies will be required with the final installment of the current tax.

If the current tax becomes delinquent under this plan, the privilege of paying back years without interest will be lost, Miss Eisner stated. If two installments on real property or one on personal property are allowed to go unpaid, the property is subject to immediate foreclosure.
