### Rules Changed in Rehabilitation

It has often been asked why more publicity was not given to the work of rehabilitation, especially in its earlier stages. The answer is simple. Like most emergency programs, it was under the process of operation and being organized at the same time. Any article published at that time might have caused conflicting ideas which would only result in wasted time for the supervisors to straighten out with an influx of office callers.

As first organized under the State Rural Rehabilitation Corporation, clients were to be selected from the relief rolls only. It was policy that relief aid needed very little advertising. After several months of searching the relief rolls for clients who might be assisted, a very limited number was found on the relief side, but a much larger number on the border line not yet on relief but who were selling their livestock and equipment to keep off. Others were stretching their credit beyond the bounds of elasticity on the strength of having a good risk in better times. This in turn dragged helping lenders to the same level and finally would result in an increased relief roll due to the fact that the loan was not for the purpose of increasing their earning power but to save them from distress and starvation.

This condition was carefully considered by the Administration and remedied. Now it is not necessary to have been on the relief to be eligible for this assistance. The qualifications require (1) that a condition exists whereby it is impossible to secure financial assistance from other recognized loaning agencies that are not charging exorbitant rates of interest, and that a loan will increase their earning power on a farm or preserve the one which they now have; and (2) that the applicant must be a farm family, which is defined as one who, when last regularly employed, received the major portion of their income from agricultural enterprises, either as farm operator or laborer well qualified to make a living in that way. Rehabilitation does not attempt to accept the casualties of other enterprises and give them a "whirl" at farming. It is no longer just a question of moving onto a division of the old homestead, without the overhead of interest on investment, where a hen was only required to lay eggs in the springtime. Making nature produce out of season requires an expert

the forces of bayonet, according to the legion leader, who said their hope is that our rivers would run red with the blood of revolution. He pointed out that less than 300,000 overturned the Russian government. Converts, he said, are being secured in our schools and colleges and that 8000 are publicly on the registration rolls in Oregon.

Communism was described by Koehn as the hatred of God and all forms of religion, advocacy of the destruction of private property and inheritance, social and racial equality, class hatred, sabotage, destruction of all forms of representative and democratic government, and the establishment of one country with the capitol in Moscow, Russia.

Commander Koehn described Russia as a gigantic pothouse, where millions are on the verge of starvation and where 4,000,000 starved to death. The government, he said, holds money more valuable than the lives of its people and has destroyed all religion. There is not a single worker, according to the legion chief, who owns his own home and own automobile. The attempt to strike, he said, is considered a counter revolution and is met with death at the hands of a firing squad or banishment to Siberia. It is, he said, virtual slavery and reversion to the dark ages.

The American Legion, declared the commander, asks the immediate severance of diplomatic relations with the Soviet government. They have forgotten all promises made at the time of recognition and have used this opening only as an opportunity to spread their doctrines of revolution, according to Koehn. Commander Koehn was introduced by William F. Cyrus, commander of Hillsboro post.

The "Pepeco" robot, a huge mechanical man that waved his arms and carried on a spirited conversation with guests, held the center of the speaker's table.
