Newspaper Story Effective OREGON CITY—The effectiveness of newspaper publicity was convincingly illustrated in Clackamas county recently, according to County Agent J. J. Inskeep. Mr. Inskeep released an article to the papers of the county in which he advocated the use of organic mercury in place of the older wet dip method of treating seed grain. In a very short time seed stores reported a 50 per cent increase in sales of this material over any previous like period, saying that many growers came into the stores with the article clipped from the paper and asked for the material.
