Philippine Islands Prove Powder Keg

The islands while the farm bloc opposed the free entrance into the United States of coconut oil and other products related to farm produce.
Ninety per cent of the Philippine products were exported to the United States while trade with the United States placed the islands at our ninth best customer.
But with the freedom, he said, also came a five per cent export tax on island produce, which will be in effect for five years and then increase until the ninth year. Sterling pointed out that this tax had a detrimental effect upon Philippine exports to America.
Japanese and Chinese now have gained control of much of the business of the islands including the fisheries, he declared, and still are pushing economic infiltration in the islands.
In relation to politics and the stability of the present government there, he remarked that President Quezon was not physically fit and in fear of his life. During the various functions in connection with the inauguration, Quezon did not appear, but lived in seclusion on his yacht in the harbor at Manila, until time for the inauguration.
From the Philippines, Sterling turned to Japan and China. Japan, he pointed out, lacked natural resources necessary to carry on war and could not produce enough food stuffs in the islands to feed the population. There now are 65 million Japanese while the population is growing at the rate of a million a year.
On the mainland, Sterling remarked, was China with an overburdened population of which only seven per cent could read or write. The poorer classes, he explained, lived on tenant farms where they worked from day to day and never left even to go to market.
Many of the congressmen, getting their first close view of the conditions in the Orient, declared themselves alarmed over the freedom of the island and the relationship of this act to the designs of other countries, particularly those with imperialistic tendencies.
W. Verne McKinney acted as chairman, introducing the speaker. Mayor J. H. Garrett reported on the meeting here of the League of Oregon Cities and said that in a conversation with Mayor Joe Carson of Portland, Carson told him that if the airport bonds carried.

of John Hoffer. The damage suits were the result of the arrest of Heintz and Hoffer February 18, 1933, when they were found removing wood from a woodpile owned by the company.
Charges of theft were brought against them and the Heintz were indicted by the grand jury, but found not guilty on trial. A not true bill was returned in the case of Hoffer.
The original actions were brought in Multnomah county and brought here on a change of venue two months ago.
Another of several suits to recover property sold on the 1935 tax foreclosure sale, was filed in circuit court this week when Earl G. Beck brought suit against James W. Jeffries to recover possession of 80 acres of timber in section 25 3 north and 3 west. The complaint alleges that the property was worth \$3,000 and that it was taxed \$32.58 in 1930 and foreclosed by the county in proceedings begun in November, 1930. The property was sold in the sale which began April 19, 1935, for the sum of \$131.74 taxes and costs.
In asking for recovery, the suit sets forth that the county failed to offer a portion of the property to cover amount due but sold it as a whole piece and that the sale was void by reason that the amounts charged are indefinite and uncertain and that no bill of costs was filed.
A similar case was recently decided for the owner of record by Judge R. Frank Peters in circuit court.

Word of grueling speed and economy tests recently passed by stock Willys "77" sedans was received this week by the Used Car Exchange, local dealers.
Speed tests under which the car was driven 24 hours non-stop, except for gas and oil, on the Mojave desert in Southern California resulted in a total of 1705 miles, or an average of 71.07 miles per hour. Bob McKenzie, racing star, drove the car.
In an economy test on the San Diego speedway, the Willys "77" averaged 45.04 miles per hour for 24 hours and turned in a record of 36.63 miles per gallon. Two first place cups in its class were won by a Willys in the recent Gilmore-Yosemite economy run, one for the fastest time and another for using less gasoline than any of the 30 cars competing.
